





Longitudinal Data System (ATLAS) Update

Room: 102

Nathan Rankin, Office of Education and Workforce Statistics

The Alabama Terminal for Linking and Analyzing Statistics (ATLAS) on Career Pathways is the state's Statewide Longitudinal Data System. As a federated data solution, ATLAS brokers connections between multiple state partner agencies from preschool, K12, higher education, and workforce development, while ensuring they maintain control of their data. Under the governance of the P20W Council, chaired by the Governor of Alabama and managed by the Office of Education and Workforce Statistics, (OEWS) ATLAS supports research that requires cross-agency collaboration to understand program outcomes and participant pathways. The system maintains rigorous privacy and security protocols, including data deidentification and strict aggregation rules for published reports. Codified through the Alabama Credential Quality and Transparency Act of 2023, ATLAS brings together key state agencies to create throughlines for program outcomes and performance metrics. This presentation will explore how ATLAS's governance structure, privacy framework, and partner collaboration model enable evidencebased policy decisions while maintaining the highest standards of data security and privacy, along with modernization efforts and lessons learned.

Session 1: Creating Academic Optimism at Your Institution

Room: 104

Sidney L. Brown, Tuskegee University

This session will equip faculty and administrators with the essential skills, knowledge, and dispositions required to foster Academic Optimism within your institution. We will explore key pillars derived from data that assesses the organizational climate, with a focus on building Academic Optimism, Collective Efficacy, Faculty Trust, and Academic Emphasis.

Through this presentation, educators and administrators will gain a deeper understanding of how the school environment—shaped by both formal and informal structures, as well as the political dynamics within the institution—affects the motivation and behavior of teachers and administrators. Attendees will be introduced to the concept of organizational climate and how it can range from stagnant to thriving, determining whether your institution is moving forward, maintaining, or facing challenges.

By the end of the session, participants will be equipped with actionable strategies to cultivate a positive, optimistic school culture that drives student success and strengthens the overall educational experience.

Session 2: Using Generative AI to Assist Data Analytics

I will begin by providing an overview of what generative AI is, and its limitations. I will also discuss ethical concerns using gen AI tools. I will then present a problem of identifying toxic and beneficial course combinations for student enrollments. I will provide step by step guides for using generative AI tools to assist in data analytics to provide data on course combinations that result in lower than average grades, or progress towards degree, or benefits therein. The session will end with a discussion on other types of heavy lift data analytics generative AI, or other tools, could be used for by participants, and limitations.

Session 3: Career Pathways of Agriculture Students: An Introspective Look Through a 40-Year Lens

As technological advancements reshape the agricultural industry, workforce demands continue to evolve, requiring new skills, credentials, and career pathways. To effectively align educational programs with industry needs, accurate institutional data reporting practices and program inventory oversight are essential. This session will explore the intersection of workforce development, program reporting practices, and policy implementation, with a focus on Alabama's agricultural sector.

Over the past 40 years, shifts in technology, conservation practices, cultural perspectives, and standardized reporting have significantly impacted agricultural education. Understanding these historical and future trends is key to aligning academic strategies with industry developments.

A major challenge in addressing these workforce gaps lies in the accuracy and consistency of institutional data reporting. The correct use of CIP identifiers and precise data collection are vital in shaping policy decisions, funding allocations, and program viability. This session will emphasize the impact of institutional data and program oversight, ensuring accuracy and completeness before data leaves the reporting institution.

Session 5: Welcoming the Clear Blue Sky: Research at ACCS Institutions

Room: 104

Zicheng Hong once said, "[i]f the mind is illumined, there is a clear blue sky in a dark room." At the ACCS, we seek to peer into the corners of darkened rooms and bring forth the light. Over the last decade, academicians from four-year and two-year institutions have been encouraged to conduct research at our institutions, as long as the findings are shared with our colleges and the system office. In 2019, the ACCS created a federally registered IRB, and ever since, researchers have been steadily submitting protocols. This presentation will provide an overview of different research projects conducted at ACCS institutions and will highlight some illuminating findings. A discussion will be held about possible next steps that might be taken to share results more broadly.

Session 6: On goal setting, potential, and gratitude

Session 7: The Impact of Troy University's QEP: Evaluating student and faculty focused initiatives

This presentation describes the assessment plan and updated outcomes of Troy University's Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP). The QEP was put in place in 2020 as a part of the SACSCOC reaffirmation process, and adds to ongoing efforts aimed at reinforcing its position as Alabama's International Institution. This plan involves two independent but complementary globally-focused initiatives intended to: 1) enhance the learning experience of students by promoting international scholarship and research abroad, and; 2) promote inter-cultural competency among employees as a form of professional development. This assessment strategy is being utilized by the Office of Institutional Research, Planning, and Effectiveness, members of the Institutional Effectiveness Committee, and a QEP Leadership Team in order to measure the progress of these separate but complementary initiatives. Additional efforts to assist with the preparation of the QEP Impact Report will be explained, and numerous "lessons learned" will be discussed for the benefit of others involved in the preparation, implementation, and evaluation of a QEP.

Session 9: Tracking Dual Enrollment and Applicant Conversions

I will describe the need for tracking conversion of dual-enrollment students from dual-enrollment to first-time students at your institution. I will then present on my process to determine the conversion rate from dual-enrollment to first-time student using data found through ACCS ARGOS reports, the STU file, and using python coding. I will discuss the types of data, and alternatives that can be used based on data available. We will then discuss looking for pitfalls in the data analytics, to ensure you are measuring what you think you are measuring.

If time allows, I will also cover using tools such as chatgpt or claude.ai to assist in basic Python programming to assist in data analytics for someone with basic to no knowledge of Python code.

11:10-12:00 PM Keynote Address (Momentum)

Russ Bartlett has been flying, building, or selling airplanes his whole adult life. He was a U.S. Navy F/A-18 Hornet pilot. He was Commanding Officer and Flight Leader of the legendary Blue Angels. Upon retirement from the Navy, he took the things he learned flying and leading, especially at the Blue Angels, to the Aerospace and Defense industry. He was president of Beechcraft Defense Company, CEO of Textron Airborne Solutions, and COO at Kaman Aerospace Corporation. In those roles, he tested, tweaked, and validated his best practices and is currently out on the speakers' circuit to share them with the American people.

But his journey sure didn't start that way! As an adventurous 11-year-old growing up on Nantucket Island, he fell in love with his Honda Trail 70 dirt bike and has had multiple motorcycles in his life ever since. His pre-teen summers were spent on the water, unsupervised, in a 13-foot Boston Whaler speedboat (Mom, what were you thinking???). After high school he landed at the United States Naval Academy, one of the best things that ever happened to him. Despite the great college start, he called his parents at the end of his sophomore year to tell them he was quitting the Naval Academy to become a professional motocross rider. Somehow Mom and Dad talked him off the ledge on the dirt bike thing. Russ decided that becoming a Naval Aviator was the closest thing he could find to riding motocross. And the rest is history.

Captain Russ "Beef" Bartlett, U.S. Navy (retired), became a combat-seasoned F/A-18 Hornet pilot and was a squadron commander twice: the first time as the Commanding Officer of a Navy Strike Fighter squadron, forward-deployed to the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk in Japan; and the second time as Commanding Officer and Flight Leader of the Blue Angels. He accumulated 4400 flight hours (3200 or so in the Hornet) and made 841 aircraft carrier arrested landings, 333 of them at night. Post-Navy, he's been in leadership roles in corporate America ever since. He lives his life by his simple motto: "Drive fast. Take chances."
