#### Measuring What Matters: Rethinking Success Metrics for Career-Focused and Applied Programs

Traditional student success metrics, such as retention, time to degree, and graduation rates, remain important in higher education, yet they often fail to fully capture the impact of career-focused and applied programs. As institutions expand workforce-aligned pathways, institutional research (IR) offices are increasingly called upon to develop measures that better reflect program effectiveness, labor market relevance, and institutional mission.

This session explores how IR can lead the transformation of success measurement for applied and career-oriented programs by incorporating complementary indicators such as employment outcomes, wage progression, industry credentials, licensure attainment, and employer engagement. Drawing on examples from career and technical education and work-based learning, the presentation highlights practical strategies for integrating these measures into existing IR frameworks.

**Dual Enrollment in Alabama: A Decade of Transformation**

Dual enrollment has become a larger portion of the college and university population in Alabama. As the custodian of higher education data for Alabama, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education (ACHE) will share a historical review of dual enrollment trends across the state, highlighting shifts in student demographics, institutional participation, and geographic distribution. Attention will be given to how access has expanded among student populations and across different post-secondary institutions. The session will also examine student outcomes, including credential attainment and continued enrollment in higher education after high school graduation. By tracing these changes, participants will gain insight into how dual enrollment is influencing student success in Alabama.

**Troy University's QEP: Comprehensive Internationalization for Continuous Quality Enhancement**

Troy University continues its comprehensive internationalization efforts in order to reinforce its status as Alabama's "International Institution." Our latest QEP was used to implement a plan that would promote global scholarship among students, and also mindfulness of cultural differences among employees working in traditional and on-line settings. This effort involved a student-focused initiative designed to enhance study-abroad activities, and an employee-focused initiative that led to the creation of a podcast devoted to promoting conversations about inter-cultural interactions and "belonging" in higher education. This presentation describes those initiatives in greater detail, provides information about implementation approaches, and discusses the multi-pronged assessment strategy used to measure progress. Conducted under the supervision of the university's Office of Institutional Research, Planning, and Effectiveness, our summary evaluation is discussed along with some of the lessons we learned. This presentation serves to benefit academic professionals involved in the preparation, implementation, and evaluation of any quality enhancement initiative.

**Time to Degree at the Graduate Level**

Auburn University's Office of Institutional Research is periodically asked to provide time-to-degree calculations at the graduate level to support reporting, planning, and decision-making, but several variables make it difficult to arrive at a simple rate. For example, graduate students are often part-time, often pursuing multiple degrees, and frequently earn a degree having been enrolled in something else until their last term. If we exclude all those students who don't pursue a specific degree full-time from beginning to end, the population size decreases substantially. Instead of providing a rate, we have historically provided raw data to allow requestors to make their own decisions about handling the variables. Through recent collaboration with Auburn's Graduate School, IR has created a more user-friendly data extract. In this session, IR will review the SQL code and dataset, and the Graduate School will describe how they use it to produce time to degree charts.

**Smarter Surveys with AI: Building a Dynamic Prospective Student Survey**

This session showcases the design and implementation of a prospective student survey for the University of Alabama System (UAS). Developed to understand the college preferences and decision-making factors of Alabama high school seniors, the survey leverages AI-driven tools to enhance both functionality and visual appeal. It features a dynamic autocomplete question format, allowing respondents to quickly find and select their preferred institutions, replacing the standard dropdown approach. AI was used to generate and structure a JSON file hosted on GitHub, which the survey dynamically accesses in real time. Custom AI-assisted JavaScript powers advanced branching logic, including checks on respondents' top college choices. Embedded data fields, sourced from both the external JSON and respondent input, are captured for downstream questions, enabling tailoring of survey logic. AI-generated HTML further enhances visual engagement through interactive hover features for images and messages about the universities. By combining AI, GitHub-hosted datasets, and sophisticated survey logic, the instrument improves efficiency, data quality, and the overall participant experience. Additionally, AI-assisted reporting enables more user-friendly Power BI visualizations and streamlined analysis of open-ended responses. This project demonstrates a practical model for institutional research teams seeking to modernize survey instruments, providing actionable insights into student decision-making and showcasing a replicable approach for integrating AI into survey design, testing, and execution.

**Creating a Streamlined Project Tracking System in Microsoft 365**

Finding and maintaining a project tracking system that fits an institutional research office's needs can be expensive, laborious, or both. There are a wide array of packaged software as well as seemingly infinite in-house solutions, but small offices often face limited resources. This presentation will cover a Microsoft-based system that is flexible, easy to implement, and included with a A1, A3, or A5 Microsoft 365 subscription. The system uses a client-facing Microsoft Forms as well as the functionality of Microsoft Power Automate to help input and manage project requests in a Microsoft SharePoint list. We will cover how the development of such a system has progressed at The University of Alabama as well as steps to create one's own system. This solution allows for KPI tracking, a collaborative workflow, and additional automation opportunities. Attendees will leave with insights on creating their own similar project tracking system.

**From Fall to Spring: Using Persistence Data and AI-Assisted Analysis to Drive Student Success**

### **Colonel Chris Richie, USMC (Retired)**

Chris is a retired U.S. Marine Corps Colonel with a 30-year career of global leadership, including support of combat and humanitarian operations, diplomatic service at the U.S. Embassy in Abu Dhabi, and command of the Marine Corps' largest Aviation Command and Control (AC2) organization. He has led thousands of people across 20 countries and earned numerous personal and unit-level awards, including the Defense Superior Service Medal and Legion of Merit.

Since 2022, Chris has served as Director of Human Resource Development at Auburn University and teaches leadership in the Harbert College of Business. His team envisioned and created a university wide employee leadership development program that has produced over 1,200 graduates in the inaugural year. He sits on the Board of Directors for the Auburn University Credit Union and the NROTC Alumni Association and is Vice President of the East Alabama Chapter of Military Officer's Association of

America.

Chris is a keynote speaker, mentor, and three-time award-winning author. His latest book, *The Invisible Medal: Leading with a Higher Purpose*, is an Amazon best-seller.


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
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
